Bangladesh's Policy on Peacekeeping

Article-25 of Bangladesh Constitution:

- · Respect for National Sovereignty and Equality
- Non-interference in the internal affairs of other countries
- Peaceful settlement of international disputes
- Respect for international laws and the Principles of the UN Charter

Policy (contd)

- · General and complete disarmaments
- Supports oppressed peoples throughout the world
- · Strongly believes in Multilateralism
- BD participates in peacekeeping operations under the Chapter VI of the UN Charter

Policy (contd)

- · Bangladesh firmly believes that the UNSC
 - Mandate and broader International supports are vital prerequisites for the successful UN PKOs
- Bangladesh is ready to work to further develop the concept of 'Strategic Reserve Force'
- BD welcomes UNDPKOs initiative to launch an 'Integrated Training Service'

Policy (contd.)

- State party to major disarmament treaties: NTP, CTBT, CWC, CCW, BTWC, APMBT, etc.
- State party to major international Humanitarian Laws ICCPR, ICESCR, CRC, CEDAW, CAT, CERD, etc.
- State party to 'Laws of War'-the Geneva Convention', Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide, etc.
- Bangladish strongly adhers s to the international Humanitarian Laws (IHLs) and oblige to upholds Human Rights, even in the times of difficulty/conflicts

Role of MOFA in Deployments Troops to UN Peacekeeping Missions

- MOFA, through the Permanent Mission BD in New York, actively follows, and engages when applicable in, the debates on the issue of deployment of a UN Peacekeeping Mission in a conflict-torn country, examines the mandate and gauge the level of international support;
- MOFA assesses the political risks and sensitivity in deployment of Bangladesh troops in a peacekeeping mission

Role of MOFA (contd.)

- MOFA coordinates the country position, in consultation with Armed Forces Division, on the feasibility of deployments of troops
- MOFA coordinates with the Permanent Mission of BD in NY to present the Bangladesh Position in the meetings of the TCCs

Role of MOFA (contd.)

- MOFA, through the PMBNY, negotiates with UNDPKO the Rules of Engagement (ROE) and other modalities to protect the interests of the Bangladeshi Contingents deployed in the UN Peacekeeping Missions;
- MOFA liaises with AFD, AHq, MOHA, Police Hq, BIPSOT and other agencies to ensure that Bangladeshi Contingents are adequately briefed about the Mission Objectives and the situation on the ground, and that they are properly trained not only on combats and logistics, but also on human rights and humanitarian laws, democracy, gender sensitivity and other transition issues

Role of MOFA (contd.)

 MOFA receives feedback from the UNDPKO, Host Countries' Governments, and other stockholders on the performance of the peacekeepers, and appropriately advices the concerned agencies of the Government to ensure that Bangladesh troops continue to uphold Bangladesh's positive image and that of Bangladesh Armed Forces.
