## "The Maritime Security Situation"

Speech by H.E.Lieutenant General Ay Souliyaseng, Vice-Minister, Ministry of National Defense of Laos On the 3<sup>RD</sup> ARF Security Policy Conference 18 May 2006, Karambunai, Sabah, Malaysia

Now, please allow me to share my point of view on the Maritime Security Situation.

As well known that Laos is a landlocked country that disconnects to the seas. But the seas are very important significant to the socio-economy development in Laos; particularly the local products export as well as the import various goods from other countries in the region by sea.

As we have seen the important means on Maritime Security, and therefore the Lao government have signed the Treaty on the Law of Sea of the UN on 10 December 1982, and then ratified on 5 June 1988. I understand that the promotion of understanding of one another, trust, and cooperation on Maritime Security is the duties of each nation including either disconnected or conrected country to the seas.

We are ready to support and sharing cooperation on Maritime Security operations, counter any forms of activities that will be an obstacle to the maritime for maintaining peace, stability and development in the region.
